





Early results on the move to digital


- Sample of **48,981 students** used in the analysis –
- 5% of HE registrations. 6% of NSFAS students in sample
- Conducted by UFS from 1 August 2020 to 15 September 2020



Around 62% of sample own and another 10% have access to a laptop or desktop – but 30% don't! Nearly all have smartphones, or access to them Over 90% submitted assignments online. Over 75% accessed learning



But, only 16% have "Wi-Fi or fibre" at home – data rules!

How do ensure to work towards a new inclusive and optimal teaching and learning environment? – devices, electricity, place to study, connectivity, capacity development for teachers and students




Early study on mental health

- Sample of 14 000 students in PSET. weighted
- Conducted from 18 June -18 September 2020
- Reported this last week in the Daily Maverick



Social impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on youth in the Post School Education and Training (PSET) Sector in South Africa



On the Kessler-10 scale,


- Over 65% of students experienced mild \bullet to severe psychological distress.
- Over 50% of students experienced moderate to severe
- And just over 30% severe
- "Core curriculums should be adapted to include psychosocial components that would assist maintaining and promoting health and wellbeing"




Achievement levels of COVID kids

- In grade 2 and grade 4 in no fee primary schools in EC and
- Limpopo learnt <u>50%-75%</u> less in 2020 than 2019.
- Altogether "54% reduction in schooling last year" school
